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Jerry Jones accepts Bob McNair's challenge and gives \$1 million gift towards building American Cancer Society Hope Lodge Houston

TEXAS (June 29, 2015) – The American Cancer Society announced the largest gift to date toward the fundraising challenge issued by The Robert and Janice McNair Foundation to help build an American Cancer Society Hope Lodge in Houston. Jerry Jones, owner of the Dallas Cowboys, has donated \$1 million through The Gene and Jerry Jones Family Foundation. As part of the Society's mission to save lives and relieve suffering from cancer, Hope Lodge Houston will provide no-cost lodging and support to those traveling from across America to receive cancer treatment in Houston.

As announced earlier this year, The Robert and Janice McNair Foundation extended a 2 to 1 challenge opportunity until December 31, 2015. For every \$2 the Society raises, the McNair Foundation will give \$1 up to \$4 million to help us reach ground breaking by the end of 2015.

"Cancer is already daunting enough, but worrying about travel, lodging, and other necessities while enduring treatment can be a huge burden," Jones said. "Gene and I are proud we can help by joining Bob and Janice McNair and President George and Barbara Bush as they work to bring a Hope Lodge to Houston."

Bob McNair praised the Jones' for their generous gift. "We are grateful to our friends, Gene and Jerry Jones, for recognizing the need and helping us reach our campaign goal this year," he said. "By coming together and supporting a project like Hope Lodge Houston we are able to make a greater impact for deserving cancer patients."

The McNair's were moved to issue this challenge grant after Bob McNair was diagnosed with squamous cell carcinoma in 2014. He was treated at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston and was recently given a clean bill of health. Throughout his cancer journey McNair saw firsthand the thousands of patients who come to Houston to receive their treatment. "These folks are from all over and the added expense of coming here and staying for an extended period of time brings an additional burden onto a family that is already under so much stress," says McNair.

There are currently 31 Hope Lodges operated by the Society nationwide, including Lubbock. Due to patient demand, Hope Lodge Houston will be the largest in the nation with 62 patient suites. At capacity, the Lodge will offer approximately 23,000 nights of lodging per year, representing a combined savings of over \$2 million to patients.

Hope Lodge Houston will be open year-round with a unique homelike setting that includes a shared kitchen, dining spaces, a help-yourself pantry, daily access to fresh linens, patient laundry facilities and a library with Internet access as well as free transportation to and from treatment facilities. Once constructed, Hope Lodge Houston will be southeast Texas' first and only no-cost residence specifically for cancer patients, helping to alleviate the overwhelming financial burden these families face.

"Bob and Janice McNair are family-oriented, entrepreneurial, and civic-minded. They have provided a simple way to make a meaningful contribution to the future health of thousands of cancer patients," said Sandy Biggers, American Cancer Society's campaign director.
